Cheating Is Pervasive—Detection Measures Must Keep Up



During their academic career, **up to 70%** of students admit to cheating, but **less than 2%** say they've been caught.

## Institutional Staff Pay the Price of Reported Cheating Cases

As cheating cases are reported, institutions bear the brunt of the burden. The immense time commitment required to investigate these cases strain both faculty and administrative teams.





#### The Strain on Staff Carries Real Financial Costs

Managing academic misconduct comes at a steep price. These figures represent the equivalent cost of the extensive staff time spent investigating and addressing suspected cheating.<sup>6</sup>
